Changing our economy and culture to one which truly respects and serves the planet and all people is part of what Time Bank Boulder is about. Right Relationship Boulder focuses on helping Indigenous Peoples feel welcome and teaching about their heritage, especially those whose homeland we live in.

I became involved with RRB by attending a workshop called Roots of Injustice, Seeds of Change which traced the historic and ongoing impacts of the Doctrine of Discovery, the 15th-century justification for European subjugation of Indigenous (non-Christian, non-white) peoples. It focused on increasing knowledge and understanding regarding the impacts of these devastating policies both in the past and even today in our institutions and ourselves and then explore ways to take action toward righting our relationships with those

whose land we occupy.

And whose land might that be? If you are reading this newsletter as a member of TBB, you live on the homeland of the Ute, Arapaho, and Chevenne, who are being welcomed by Right Relationship Boulder in cooperation with the City of Boulder into healing relationships with the land and people residing here.

A Report on the Annual Meeting

For this new member, the January 27th Annual Meeting of TimeBank Boulder began with trying to locate the building where the meeting was being held. The address alone, without any directions, is misleading. A phone call to the main number of Boulder Public Library yielded the necessary data, and as she pulled up in front of the Meadows Branch, she found herself chuckling, "This is some initiation!"

Don Parcher started things off by welcoming everyone, inviting members and guests to introduce ourselves to each other. Group photos came next, both formal and fun, then we launched into the potluck lunch as the room buzzed with conversation and laughter.

Dan Ziskin began the actual meeting with an invocation, then yielded the floor to Jan DeCourtney for her State of Our TimeBank Address. She started off by noting that our group is indeed "alive and kicking," boasting 131 members at present, up from 115 at the end of the previous year. She gave credit to the strong core of dedicated people, including those who had served and will serve on the Board, as well as all members who'd engaged in active trading. She expressed pride in the new

website that's up and running, as well as the email newsletter that goes out each month. She cited Ashley Doriss's work with Membership as one of the reasons for growth, and added that more events have also helped to attract new members.

Jan noted that it has been an advantage to have TimeBank Boulder affiliated with hOurworld, which currently has 44,294 members worldwide. She also told us that within the Boulder group, only 22 members did not make an exchange within the last year, the highest rate of participation in our 16-year history.

Jan then spoke about ideas she has for continued improvements. She envisions adding more Team Leaders, perhaps in areas like social media marketing and organizing with partner organizations. She also likes the idea of organizing teams for specific tasks, such as reviving the moving team and gardening teams and starting a housecleaning team, speaking to the fun and efficiency of working together.

She remarked that, being the introvert she is, perhaps her being president will inspire

others to find the courage to step up into roles where they, too, will thrive. "Dream big!" she reminded us, "And make those dreams come true!"

Howard Lambert, who has been a member since the timebank began, spoke about the rare and remarkable 16-year history of our fiscally solvent group. Then Jan ended her talk available for members to distribute and by brainstorming ideas for future events: a salad bar for summer, a baked potato or taco bar for fall, etc. She cited the fun of the women's clothing and household goods exchange and suggested that this year's might be followed by a community yard sale. Craft & Laugh and Health and Wellness Support already exist and are going strong. When asked for ideas for other events, someone suggested a Karaoke Night and Chiu-Ki Chan said that if others wanted an outing to the Pacific Ocean Market (POM) in Broomfield, she'd be happy to join the group and translate the packages written in Chinese.

Bonnie Sundance spoke about Our Sacred Earth's programs, activities designed to deepen one's connection to our environment. She spoke about her anguish upon hearing the newest reports on climate change stating that we have only a decade to turn things around. In response, she created a challenge/offer to anyone who wants to learn how to reduce their carbon footprint by at least 25% over the next year.

Ashley Doriss spoke next, thanking Howard and Gail Wagner for doing New Member Orientations. She hopes 2019 will bring even more members, reminding us to talk about TBB to everyone, encouraging others to attend events and think about exchanges they'd like to make. She mentioned that flyers are thanked Dorothy Cohen for joining the Instead of potlucks, perhaps we might organize Membership team, reminding the rest of those present that there's always room for more people on the committee.

> At this point Ashley took the people who were there as prospective members to another room for a New Member Orientation while the rest of the group heard from each of those standing for election to the 2018 Board of Directors, voted, and congratulated the winners.

> G. Paul Bailey spoke about TBB's newest organizational member, Boulder Kiwanis, and explained the mission of the service organization and talked about some upcoming events.

After that, there was a group effort to collect leftovers, put the dirty dishes in the bin, gather up all the trash, and load the cars so people could head home. It was an almost-zero waste event, so the main trash was food scraps and other compostables and once all the work was completed the adorable faces hanging on the wall and observing the meeting seemed to smile in approval of our efforts.
